Construction Corner

As with any major and complex construction project, some adjustments to the timeline for the addition and renovations at New Prairie High School have been necessary. Although work on the additions and new construction at the high school — including a new main entry, a "Hall of Excellence" corridor connecting the east and west wings and a new auditorium — was slated to begin this May, the project has been delayed until May 2018. Some renovations inside of the high school will still be completed over the next year.

NPUSC will be sending out a new, detailed timeline explaining why the construction schedule was adjusted and the new dates for various projects. Please keep an eye out for that communication.

All elementary school projects are still on schedule to begin in May 2017 and be completed by August 2017, just in time for the new school year. You'll likely see construction crews outside of your neighborhood school this summer. Here is what they are working on:

Over 20 NPHS students Advance to HOSA Nationals in Orlando this June

A group of New Prairie High School students have qualified to attend a national leadership conference that aims to develop compassionate, quality healthcare professionals. In late June, 21 students will travel to HOSA's 40th Annual International Leadership Conference in Orlando. At the conference, students will compete in events focused on leadership, professional and technical skills while also networking with people from across the globe with similar career goals. HOSA is an international student organization that promotes career opportunities in the healthcare industry while also improving the delivery of quality healthcare to all people.

To earn a spot at conference, New Prairie students first had to compete against 1,300 other Indiana students at the 2017 Indiana State Leadership Conference. More than 50 students competed at the state level, and half of them finished in the top three of their respective events, qualifying them for the national conference. Each of the students pick one or more categories to compete in, with categories including medical terminology, medical law and ethics, clinical nursing, physical therapy or medical assisting.

Teacher and advisor Tonya Aerts said HOSA helps students develop a strong work ethic and allows students to take

ownership of their own learning.

"I try to direct them, but they're completely responsible for preparing for their events on their own," she said. "I set up guidelines to help them stay focused, but the preparation is all on them. It helps them develop their own study skills, public speaking skills, presentation skills and — depending on the category or event — it might even help them learn some handson skills."

She said that while other schools in the state and throughout the country have HOSA classes, it is an extracurricular activity at New Prairie. That means that while students from other teams have time during the school day to practice for HOSA, New Prairie students must dedicate their own time to practice.

"No one is forcing them to mentally or physically invest in this. They choose that for themselves," Aerts said. "It catapults them into another level of thinking and prepares them for what's

potentially ahead of them."

HOSA is a quickly growing club at New Prairie. When the team first formed at the school about five years ago, only 10 students participated. This year, more than 90 students took part in HOSA at some level. Part of the interest is because students believe they can find great careers in the health care industry. Employment of health care occupations is projected to grow 19 percent through 2024, much faster than the average for all occupations, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. More than 2 million new jobs are expected to be added in that time, more than any other group of occupations.

Aerts said the members' passion is also driving more students to join HOSA. She also thanked New Prairie United School Corporation administration and the Northwest Indiana Area Health Education Center for the continued support. When Aerts thinks of how hard the New Prairie students have worked to earn a place in Orlando, it brings tears to her eyes.

"They have grown so much through the whole process," she said. "It gives me chills, every time I see a kid's name get called. It brings tears to my eyes. I love to see them take ownership of something. They get to reap all the benefits, but if there's failure along the way, they can learn from that, too."

New Prairie High School Hires New Girls' Basketball Coach

One of the most successful high school basketball coaches in northern Indiana is coming to New Prairie. Eric Mauch, known as "Coach Ric," has been appointed as the New Prairie High School girls' varsity basketball coach and is looking forward

to returning to a career as a basketball coach.

"Leading the girls basketball program at NPHS is the perfect situation: a community that cares about the future of their students, values high academic success, is dedicated to improving facilities, has an overall passion for excellence and is guided by a district office and athletic department that truly care for their ultimate customer -- the New Prairie student," Mauch said. "My family and I are thrilled to be become a part of this



Mauch was the head girls'

basketball coach at South Bend St. Joseph High School from 2010-16. During that time, his teams posted an impressive win-loss record (97-42) and earned three sectional, one regional and two Northern Indiana Conference (NIC) championships. Coach Ric was voted NIC Coach of the Year three times by his peers. Mauch graduated from Lake Central High School, where he was a three-sport athlete and a member of the Lake Central 1984 IHSAA Final Four basketball team. He is a graduate of Marquette University, where he played college football and baseball.

Mauch is the Manager of Network Services at the University of Notre Dame for the Office of Information Technology. His wife, Kim, is the Director of Marketing and Communications for Saint Pius X Catholic Church/School in Granger. They have a son, Jake, a student at Notre Dame, and a daughter, Hannah, a student at Marquette University in MIlwaukee.

"We have hired an outstanding basketball coach," said Brian Williamson, New Prairie's Director of Athletics. "His knowledge of the game and coaching abilities are second to none. Coach Ric is a person of strong character and will bring many life lessons to our athletes."

Mauch's appointment was unanimously approved by the NPUSC Board of Trustees in April and he began his duties at New Prairie immediately.

"We are excited and honored that Coach Ric is bringing his talents to New Prairie," Superintendent Paul White said. "He brings instant credibility to our program, and his energy and passion for the game is unmatched. We look forward to supporting Coach Ric and our female athletes to take our program to new heights."

21st Century Learning Grant Gives 700+ Students Access to After-School Enrichment and Remediation

During the 2014-15 school year, NPUSC received a 21st Century Community Learning Center (CCLC) grant from the Indiana Department of Education (IDEO) after completing and submitting a rigorous application. The district is now in year three of the 4-year grant, which provides funding for after-school remediation and enrichment for students in all grade levels.

The grant, which will have provided nearly \$850,000 by the end of the school year, requires the school district to provide after school programming at each school for the duration of the school year, meet certain attendance goals, as well as submit data and financial budgets to the IDOE.

Thanks to the grant, NPUSC is able to provide after-school programming to far more children than ever before. Prior to the grant, two of the elementary schools offered after-school programming, but programming is now available at all five of the district's schools.

According to data collected during the 2015-16 school year, out of the 738 students who attended more than 30 or 60 days (30 days for middle school and high school; and 60 days for the elementary schools), 40-percent showed higher math grades and 39-percent showed higher English and language arts grades. In addition, over 75-percent of students who participated showed improvement in completing their homework according to their teachers.

The after-school programming provide equal parts remediation and enrichment. Remediation typically comes in the form of homework help. Enrichment comes from various sources including partnerships with IU Health and Wells Fargo as well as Lego Robotics, BioMedical Club, Young Astronauts and occasional enrichment field trips.

Thanks to the CCLC grant, NPUSC students are able to get the after-school academic help they need as well learn and experience new and interesting things!
