The New Prairie United School Corporation will be offering free meals to students ages 18 and younger from July 19-30. Onsite breakfasts will be available daily at the middle school from 7–7:30 a.m., and lunches will be provided from 11 a.m.–12 p.m.

New Prairie Receives Heart Safe School Distinction

While New Prairie High School has received many honors over the past year, one of the school's greatest achievements was its recognition as the first high school in Indiana to receive a Heart Safe School Distinction from Project ADAM. This honor signifies that New Prairie has training programs in place so that both students and staff can provide a swift, potentially life-saving response in the case of an emergency involving a cardiac event.

Project ADAM was founded over 20 years ago in honor of Adam Lemel, a high school athlete who sadly passed away during a basketball game. His death was a result of an insufficient medical response to a sudden cardiac arrest. The word "ADAM" in the organization's name stands for "Automated Defibrillators in Adam's Memory," which reflects their goal of developing resources and programs for schools nationwide to instruct in the use of automated



external defibrillators (AEDs) and CPR to save lives. Tonya Aerts, New Prairie's biomedical teacher, has relentlessly pursued a Project ADAM partnership for the school for over two years. This venture was made more difficult because there weren't resources already in place in Indiana for this type of program. However, she was inspired by the tragic stories of Jake West and Mark Mayfield, two local student athletes who passed away in a similar manner to Adam Lemel. With the support of these students' parents, and the administration at New Prairie, Aerts helped coordinate a connection between Riley Hospital, Project ADAM and New Prairie.

When asked about this endeavor, Aerts stated, "I couldn't wait for another sudden cardiac arrest event to happen... Every student at New Prairie High School deserves to be in a rescueready environment. Every student who competes at NPHS deserves this. Every spectator deserves this. The project has taken on a path I didn't expect, creating a new generation of rescue-ready individuals. Students want to help. It empowers them. Imagine a world where we help each other instead of looking the other way. That's a goal for me.'

In order to be certified as a Heart Safe school, New Prairie had to complete a checklist of tasks, including organizing a staff to maintain AEDs and having well-marked and easily accessible AEDs throughout school buildings. Aerts has been able to procure funding to provide CPR training for the students in the Health Occupations Student Association (HOSA), and she conducts AED drills in her biomedical classes as well. In addition, she continues to encourage teachers and staff throughout the school to incorporate CPR and AED training into classes and

Cougar Mentor periods. Obtaining this certification for New Prairie has proved to be a long-term commitment, but Aerts is passionate about the program and hopes that, in time, it will expand to the district middle and elementary schools as well.

NPUSC Receives Grants for Student Activities and Learning Recovery

The New Prairie United School Corporation (NPUSC) is pleased to announce that our district has received two grants to further our mission of achieving a culture of excellence and ensuring high levels of learning for all students.

First, NPUSC received a grant from the Indiana Department of Education totaling \$644,100. The New Prairie Education Foundation will be an administration partner of this grant, and the New Carlisle Public Library and LaPorte County Public Library will be service partners. These funds will primarily be used to hire seven additional teachers whose focus will be working with students who were most impacted by learning loss during the pandemic. The monies will also be used to further literacy development and expand library access.

The second grant was awarded by the Board of Directors of the Healthcare Foundation of La Porte (HFL) in the amount of \$120,000. These funds will be used to cover afterschool enrichment programs (Empower Hour) for grades K-8. This is NPUSC's fourth year in the Empower Hour program, which encourages individuals in our community to lead healthier lifestyles. The focal points addressed in the program are food insecurity; access to exercise classes and facilities for students, families and school personnel; developing strong afterschool enrichment programs; and summer camp.

NPUSC is grateful to the financial partners who have so generously contributed to our district. These funds help our schools to continue to provide excellent education and safe activities for all students.

Online Registration for the 2021-22 School Year

Registration for the 2021-22 school year opens on July 12 for all grades. This process will be accomplished completely online using the program Power Tool Enrollment (formerly known as "Infosnap"). You may complete all of your paperwork through the Power School Enrollment website before the start of the school year. If you wish to obtain a payment plan for iPad insurance or textbooks, you must do this in person at your student's school office or at the NPUSC Central Office beginning on Monday, July 26. Further communication regarding class schedules for grades 6-12 and obtaining parking passes for high school students will be communicated from your building principal.

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Accomplishments on the Court: Celebrating New Prairie's Athletic Achievements

Despite the numerous challenges that New Prairie athletes faced during the 2020-21 season, their dedication and work ethic never wavered. As a result, their hard work was rewarded at the end of their respective seasons with numerous accolades and championship titles.

New Prairie Girls Volleyball won their third consecutive IHSAA Sectional and Regional Championships. Senior Elise Swistek, two-time Northern Indiana Conference (NIC) MVP, will be missed next year, but expectations remain high for next season as all of her talented teammates will be returning in the fall.

This past season was also significant for New Prairie Boys Basketball: they won their first IHSAA Sectional Championship since 2003. Several athletes, in particular, were instrumental to the team's success: senior Braydon Flagg was named as an Honorable Mention Selection to the All-NIC Basketball Team, and Flagg, senior Rylan McBride, and senior Hunter Smith were all Honorable Mention Selections to the IBCA All-State Academic Team.

In addition, the New Prairie's Boys Tennis team celebrates its second IHSAA Sectional win in three years, and the Boys Swimming team competed in six events at the state meet. New Prairie also honors sophomore Lillian Zelasko (cross-country), senior Elise Swistek (volleyball), and junior Hunter Whitenack (wrestling), who each received Northern Indiana Conference (NIC) MVP awards. Coaches Bruce Watson (Girls Golf) and Ashley Wojtysiak (Boys Swimming) received NIC Coach of the Year awards. Our student-athletes also performed well off the court, as the school boasted 58 All-Academic NIC Honorees over the course of the year.

New Prairie is proud of each and every student who chose to participate in the 2020-21 season despite great uncertainty and unprecedented challenges, and the Cougars look forward to another successful season ahead.
